This whitepaper is published by The One Seed Project (the “Project”), a founder-led community initiative that designed, issued, and operates the One Seed Token (“SEED”) on the XPR Network, together with the agriculture, health, wellness, and cooperative programs described in this document. The Project currently operates without a separate legal entity; it is led by its founders and core contributors in good faith pending the establishment of a formal legal structure. Establishment of an appropriate legal entity is a near-term priority. Disclosure of any change in legal form will be included in a subsequent version of this whitepaper.

The Project is distinct from One Seed Foundation Inc., a nonprofit corporation that operates as the Project’s sister initiative under the shared One Seed name and mission. One Seed Foundation Inc. is independently governed, pursues its own charitable programs, and is a separate legal person from the Project. Federal tax-exempt status of One Seed Foundation Inc. is pending and has not yet been formally recognized. Until exemption is granted, contributions to One Seed Foundation Inc. should not be relied upon as tax-deductible charitable contributions for federal income tax purposes. Donors should consult their own tax advisors regarding the treatment of any contribution.

Nothing in this whitepaper constitutes a representation about One Seed Foundation Inc.’s programs, finances, or status. Acquisition or use of SEED is an interaction with the Project, not a donation to One Seed Foundation Inc., and does not give rise to charitable deductibility, equity, profit-sharing, or other financial rights.

SEED is not a security, an investment contract, a profit-sharing instrument, an equity interest, a debt instrument, or a promise of financial appreciation. SEED conveys no ownership, dividend, or yield rights. The Project makes no representation regarding any future market value, liquidity, or tradeability of SEED. 1. Executive Summary

The One Seed Project (the “Project”) is a founder-led community initiative based in Charleston, Missouri, organized to strengthen rural agricultural production, cooperative infrastructure, and community health and wellness. The Project designs and operates the One Seed Token (SEED) and the associated programs described in this document. It currently operates without a separate legal entity; entity formation is a near-term priority. The Project operates under the “Remember Your Roots” initiative — a structured civic framework engineered for transparency, local accountability, and intergenerational continuity. One Seed Foundation Inc., a separately governed nonprofit corporation with tax-exempt status pending, is the Project’s sister initiative under the shared One Seed name and mission.

The One Seed Token (SEED) is the Project’s utility instrument, deployed on the XPR Network with a fixed, capped supply of 888,888,888,888 SEED. The full supply is minted at token creation and held in Project treasury for programmatic, event-based distribution. SEED is designed to coordinate participation, document contribution, allocate resources from treasury, and record governance decisions across approved programs. Tokens are released against documented events, then retired upon use — a disciplined ledger entry, not a speculative asset.

Core Pillars

- Agriculture & Farming Cooperative — land stewardship, equipment co-op, harvest programs, soil restoration.
- Health & Wellness — student-athlete physicals, mental health access, nutrition programs, rural healthcare partnerships.
- Education & Athletics — Bluejay Scholar Bond, Booster Token, gear grants, alumni continuity.
- Governance — the Community Quarterback Council (CQC) provides relational accountability layered above legal board oversight.

Strategic Position

The Project occupies the intersection of three underserved domains in rural America: agricultural capital formation, transparent local fundraising, and community wellness infrastructure. SEED operationalizes that intersection by binding every issuance to a verifiable real-world activity — land worked, labor contributed, services rendered, or programs completed.

If value cannot be traced to land, labor, or life, it does not belong in the system.

2. Project Mission & Mandate

2.1 Mission

The One Seed Project exists to strengthen rural communities by ensuring that food production, cooperative infrastructure, and community health are funded transparently, governed locally, and measured honestly. The Project does not operate as a venture, a brand, or a speculative platform. It operates as civic infrastructure — currently as a founder-led initiative, with formal entity establishment as a near-term governance priority.

2.2 Mandate

The Project's mandate spans three operational domains:

1. Agricultural Production and Cooperative Operations — including land stewardship, equipment-sharing pools, harvest coordination, and farm continuity programs.
2. Community Health and Wellness — including youth athletic health, nutrition access, mental health partnerships, and rural healthcare bridge programs.
3. Education and Athletic Continuity — including scholarship endowments, equipment grants, alumni networks, and youth development pipelines.

2.3 Geographic Anchor

The Project is anchored in Charleston, Missouri — a small, agriculture-centered community defined by farmland, faith institutions, sports tradition, and multigenerational families. While the model is engineered to be replicable across comparable rural communities, the founding chapter is deliberately local, deliberately small, and deliberately accountable.

2.4 Cultural Doctrine

The Project operates under five doctrinal commitments:

- Legacy over novelty.
- Stewardship over ownership.
- Transparency over performance.
- Documented contribution over claimed merit.
- Local trust over external validation.

2.5 Sister Initiatives

The Project operates within an ecosystem of independently governed initiatives that share its underlying principles. These relationships are mission-based and reputational. The Project does not direct, control, or share governance with sister initiatives, and references to them in Project materials are descriptive only — not statements of partnership, affiliation, or fiduciary commitment, unless and until formal agreements are documented and disclosed.

One Seed Foundation Inc.

One Seed Foundation Inc. is the Project's sister nonprofit corporation, operating under the shared One Seed name and mission. The Project and One Seed Foundation Inc. are separate legal persons, each with independent governance, decision-making, and finances. One Seed Foundation Inc. pursues its own charitable programs and has filed for, or is in the process of filing for, federal tax-exempt recognition; that status is pending.

Any present or future flow of funds or services between the Project and One Seed Foundation Inc. — including grants, gifts, sponsorships, fiscal sponsorship arrangements, shared use of branding, or operational reimbursements — will be documented under formal agreements and disclosed in the Project's Quarterly Transparency Report. Until tax-exempt status of One Seed Foundation Inc. is formally recognized, contributions intended for the nonprofit should not be relied upon as tax-deductible for federal income tax purposes.

The Haven Ecovillage Project

The One Seed Project stands as a proud supporter of The Haven Ecovillage Project, an initiative organized around regenerative land stewardship, cooperative living, and community resilience. While the two operate at different scales and through different mechanisms — the Project strengthens rural systems that sustain a community from the outside in, while The Haven Ecovillage Project builds the intentional spaces where shared-stewardship values become daily practice — they proceed from common ground: that durable communities are built through patient care of land, transparent governance, and shared infrastructure rather than dependence on extractive capital.

3. Problem Statement & Opportunity

3.1 The Rural Capital Gap

Rural communities in the United States have experienced sustained extraction of capital, talent, and institutional infrastructure. Agricultural margins have compressed. Equipment costs have escalated. Independent farms have consolidated or closed. Local fundraising has fragmented across booster clubs, churches, and informal networks without unified reporting or shared accountability.

Federal and state programs reach a portion of these communities but rarely circulate locally with the velocity or visibility required to build durable trust. Charitable giving is frequently directional — flowing outward to national organizations rather than circulating within the community of origin.

3.2 The Transparency Gap

Even where local fundraising occurs, accountability is often informal. Funds raised are not always tied to publicly visible allocations. Outcomes are not always measured. Donors and contributors lack a structured way to verify that resources reached the intended program. This erodes participation over time, particularly among younger and out-of-area supporters who require digital-grade evidence to remain engaged.

3.3 The Coordination Gap

Agricultural cooperatives, school booster programs, faith-based wellness ministries, and chamber-led economic development efforts frequently pursue overlapping objectives without coordinated ledgers. The result is duplicated work, inconsistent reporting, and underutilized civic capital.

3.4 The Opportunity

The One Seed Project addresses these three gaps through a single, disciplined instrument: a utility token whose issuance and retirement are bound to documented community activity, governed by a layered structure of legal and relational accountability, and reported publicly on a recurring cadence. The token does not replace existing institutions; it coordinates them.

4. Solution Architecture

4.1 Three-Domain Framework

The Project organizes all programs across three operating domains. Each domain has its own committee, allocation rules, and reporting cadence.

4.2 Token-Coordinated Operations

SEED coordinates the three domains through four functional capabilities: program access, participation tracking, governance voting, and resource allocation. Each capability is bounded by formal rules; nothing operates on discretion alone.

4.3 Layered Governance

Operations are governed by four layers: a Board of Directors with legal authority, the Community Quarterback Council with relational authority, program committees with domain authority, and a Transparency Office responsible for public reporting. No single layer holds unilateral control over funds, issuance, or program approval.

4.4 Real-World Anchoring

Every digital instrument issued by the Project has an in-person counterpart: a printed certificate, a physical badge, an engraved monument, a public ledger displayed in school lobbies and chamber offices. The on-chain record is the audit trail; the in-person artifact is the community signal.

5. The SEED Token — Utility & Function

5.1 Definition

The One Seed Token (SEED) is a utility token deployed on the XPR Network and used within the One Seed Project ecosystem to support agricultural production, cooperative operations, and community health initiatives. It enables transparent allocation of resources, participation tracking, and governance across approved programs. SEED does not represent equity, ownership, or profit rights and is designed solely for functional use within verified systems.

5.2 On-Chain Identity

The following values reflect the SEED token as deployed and verifiable on the XPR Network at the time of this revision. Live values may be confirmed at any time through the XPR Network block explorer.

The full token supply was minted at the time of contract deployment and is capped. No further issuance is possible. The Project operates as the steward of the unallocated treasury balance and distributes tokens against verified programmatic events as described in Section 6.

5.3 Approved Use Categories

Tokens may be used exclusively for the following functions. Use outside these categories is prohibited by protocol rules and governance controls.

Program Access

- Seeds, tools, equipment, and training resources.
- Cooperative services and shared infrastructure access.
- Project-approved program enrollment.

Participation Records

- Verified labor contribution tracking.
- Cooperative membership verification.
- Volunteer hours and program engagement records.

Governance and Voting

- Cooperative decision-making within defined scopes.
- Program oversight and committee approvals.
- Allocation prioritization within published rule sets.

Resource Allocation

- Distribution of foundation-approved support.
- Program-to-program coordination of materials and services.
- Milestone-based fund release.

5.4 What SEED Is Not

To eliminate ambiguity, SEED is explicitly not the following:

- Not a security, investment contract, or financial instrument.
- Not a representation of equity, ownership, or beneficial interest.
- Not a profit-sharing arrangement, dividend right, or yield-bearing asset.
- Not a promise, guarantee, or expectation of price appreciation.
- Not a substitute for legal tender or a means of speculative trading.

While SEED may appear in third-party secondary markets that the Project does not operate, control, or promote, the existence of such markets does not alter SEED's utility classification or the Project's position that SEED is not offered as an investment instrument. The Project does not encourage, facilitate, or rely upon secondary trading activity.

6. Supply, Distribution, Escrow, and Retirement Logic

6.1 Fixed Supply

The SEED total supply is fixed at 888,888,888,888 SEED. The entire supply was minted at the time of token creation on the XPR Network and is non-expandable. The Project has no mint authority going forward. Supply discipline is therefore structural — embedded in the contract — and cannot be relaxed by Project discretion.

This design choice is deliberate: a capped, pre-minted supply with no future issuance authority eliminates the possibility of dilutive minting, removes a category of governance risk, and renders the token's scarcity verifiable on-chain at any time.

6.2 Treasury and Distribution

Following issuance, the entire supply was placed under Project stewardship. Of this supply, an allocated portion is held in operational treasury for programmatic distribution; reserves are held for long-term programs and partnership commitments. The Project publishes treasury wallet addresses and balance summaries in the Quarterly Transparency Report.

Distribution from treasury is event-based, not discretionary. Tokens are released from treasury only when one or more of the following conditions are independently verified:

- Agricultural production milestones documented through cooperative records.
- Cooperative labor or service contributions verified by program leads.
- Approved program participation, recognition, or membership events.
- Infrastructure deployment tied to documented Project programs.

Distribution authority is split between the program committee that proposes the release and the Board layer that authorizes it. No single individual may move tokens from treasury unilaterally; treasury custody is held under multi-signature controls.

6.3 Escrow Controls

Tokens allocated to projects may be held in program escrow prior to final release. Movement from escrow to recipient occurs only after:

4. Milestone verification by the responsible committee.
5. Documentation review by the Transparency Office.
6. Governance approval, where the program threshold requires it.

Escrow exists to prevent misuse, front-running, and extraction. Where escrow conditions cannot be met within a program's defined timeline, tokens revert to the Project's general allocation reserve for re-deployment under documented re-approval.

6.4 Retirement and Burn

Tokens are permanently retired (burned) under the following conditions:

- Use for one-time access, services, or program redemption.

- Completion or formal closure of the underlying program.
- Compliance or disciplinary action requiring removal from circulation.
- Voluntary surrender by a holder for governance or stewardship reasons.

Burn transactions are recorded on-chain to a verifiable burn address and reflected in the next Quarterly Transparency Report. Because no further minting is possible, every burn permanently reduces circulating supply. Supply discipline is therefore both structural (capped) and progressive (burned upon use).

7. Tokenomics (Non-Speculative)

7.1 Design Principles

The Project rejects speculative tokenomics on principle. The following constraints govern SEED issuance and pricing:

- Utility-based — every token released from treasury corresponds to a defined functional use.
- Fixed total supply — 888,888,888,888 SEED, minted once at deployment, non-expandable.
- Treasury custody — unallocated supply is held under Project multi-signature controls.
- Fixed program pricing — tier prices are published and held constant for the duration of a program cycle.
- No secondary market emphasis — the Project does not list, market, or promote secondary trading.
- Optional resale royalty — where resale occurs in third-party markets, an embedded royalty (typically 5%) routes back to youth or scholarship programs.

7.2 Program Tier Structure

The following tiers are illustrative and reflect the launch program structure. Specific program tiers may be adjusted by Board resolution and published in advance of any cycle.

7.3 Conservative Year-One Projection

The figures below represent a conservative model for the founding chapter and are not guarantees. They are presented for planning transparency.

7.4 Allocation Discipline

By Board policy, no fewer than 60% of net funds raised in any cycle shall flow directly to youth, scholarship, or program services. Administrative overhead is capped at 20%. The remaining 20% is reserved for agricultural and community projects, with reallocation requiring Board and CQC approval.

8. Governance Framework

8.1 Four-Layer Structure

Governance is intentionally distributed. The Project operates under four layers, each with bounded authority and documented responsibilities.

8.2 The Community Quarterback Council (CQC)

The Community Quarterback Council is a 7–11 member body of trusted local leaders representing agriculture, education, athletics, faith, small business, healthcare, city government, and chamber organizations. The Council serves as the relational accountability engine of the Project.

CQC Responsibilities

7. Public advocacy at school board, city council, chamber, and church forums.
8. Network activation to grow participation, secure sponsorships, and recruit legacy contributors.
9. Liaison roles between the Project and external institutions including the Chamber of Commerce, Black Chamber, and city government.
10. Accountability review of quarterly reports, allocation compliance, and program impact.

CQC Terms and Standards

- Standard term: two years, renewable upon Board approval.
- Activity threshold: each member commits to network engagement, hosting at least one informational gathering annually, and 75% attendance at quarterly reviews.
- Removal grounds: ethical violations, non-participation, misrepresentation, or financial misconduct.
- No honorary seats. Influence must convert to participation.

8.3 Voting Principles

Token-weighted voting is constrained by participation, not accumulation. The Project operates the following constraints:

- Caps on voting weight per wallet to prevent plutocratic drift.
- Time-bound or role-specific voting eligibility for sensitive decisions.
- Identity verification (KYC) where required by law or program scope.
- Public recording of all votes; no anonymous governance.

8.4 Conflict Resolution

Where Board, CQC, and Committee judgments conflict, the matter is referred to a written resolution process documented in the Project's bylaws. No layer may override another by informal authority.

9. Compliance & Legal Positioning

9.1 Token Classification Statement

SEED is structured as a utility token. The Project's position, supported by the operational design described in this document, is that SEED does not constitute a security under U.S. federal or state securities law. The Project does not promote SEED as an investment, does not guarantee or imply price appreciation, and does not market SEED to retail investors as a financial product.

This position is defended by the following structural elements: (i) a fixed, pre-minted, non-expandable token supply with no Project mint authority post-deployment, (ii) event-based treasury distribution tied to verifiable real-world activity rather than open sale, (iii) absence of profit, dividend, or yield rights, (iv) absence of equity or ownership claims, (v) burn-on-redemption mechanics that prevent accumulation as a passive asset, (vi) capped voting weight that prevents control acquisition through accumulation, and (vii) public, on-chain-verifiable allocation reporting that distinguishes the Project from speculative ventures.

9.2 Jurisdictional Framework

The Project operates under the laws of the State of Missouri and applicable U.S. federal law. The Project maintains documented policies covering anti-money-laundering controls, recordkeeping, tax reporting, and (where required) charitable disclosure. Programs that involve student-facing services operate under additional alignment with the relevant school district and state education statutes.

9.3 Anti-Speculation Commitments

The Project commits to the following anti-speculation practices:

- No paid promotion of SEED as an investment opportunity.
- No representations of expected return.
- No incentive structures rewarding token holding without participation.
- No unbounded supply expansion.
- No bundling of SEED with unregistered financial products.

9.4 Reporting Standards

The Project publishes a Quarterly Transparency Report covering total tokens issued, retired, allocated, and pending; total funds raised and disbursed; program-level outcomes; administrative cost ratio; and outstanding governance actions. Reports are posted to the Project website, the school lobby, the chamber office, and the cooperative office. Annual reports are formally adopted by the Board and reviewed by the CQC.

9.5 Compliance Disclaimers

The Project does not provide legal, tax, financial, or investment advice. Participants are solely responsible for compliance with the laws and regulations applicable in their jurisdiction. The

Project reserves the right to suspend or terminate participation by any party whose conduct is inconsistent with this whitepaper, the Project's bylaws, or applicable law.

9.6 Legal Form of the Project

The One Seed Project currently operates as a founder-led community initiative. It does not maintain a separate legal entity such as a corporation, limited liability company, registered foundation, or registered cooperative at this time. The Project's founders and core contributors operate it in good faith, maintaining documented operational records, multi-signature treasury controls, and the governance, allocation, and reporting commitments described in this whitepaper.

Establishing a formal legal entity for the Project is a near-term governance priority. Options under consideration include cooperative formation, limited-liability formation, or operating under a documented fiscal-sponsorship arrangement with an established nonprofit. The Project will disclose its chosen structure when finalized, with effective dates and any material changes to operational practice that result.

Until formal entity formation, the commitments described in this whitepaper — including governance, treasury custody, distribution rules, and transparency reporting — are operational commitments of the Project's founders and core contributors. They are not, at present, enforceable obligations of any registered legal entity. Prospective participants should consider this distinction when assessing participation.

9.7 Relationship with One Seed Foundation Inc.

The Project is operationally and legally distinct from One Seed Foundation Inc., its sister nonprofit corporation. The two share the One Seed name and a common mission but maintain independent governance, decision-making, and finances. Neither entity controls or directs the activities of the other.

One Seed Foundation Inc. is organized as a nonprofit corporation. Its federal tax-exempt status is pending and has not yet been formally recognized. Until that status is recognized, contributions to One Seed Foundation Inc. should not be represented or relied upon as tax-deductible charitable contributions for federal income tax purposes.

Acquisition or use of SEED constitutes participation in a program of the Project, not a charitable contribution to One Seed Foundation Inc. SEED participation does not entitle the participant to any deduction, credit, equity interest, or financial return. Any donor who wishes to support One Seed Foundation Inc.'s charitable activities should do so directly through that entity's established channels and should consult their own tax advisor regarding deductibility.

Any future arrangement under which the Project provides funding, services, branding rights, or other support to One Seed Foundation Inc. (or vice versa) will be governed by documented agreements and disclosed in the Project's Quarterly Transparency Report.

10. XPR Network Integration

10.1 Network Selection Rationale

The One Seed Token is deployed on the XPR Network, a Layer-1 proof-of-stake blockchain (formerly known as Proton) operated by an independent block-producer consortium and stewarded by Metallicus, the originating ecosystem company. The Project selected XPR Network on the basis of four operational requirements: (i) a compliance-aware infrastructure with built-in on-chain identity standards suited to programs that require documented public reporting, (ii) zero gas fees for ordinary transactions, which is appropriate for community-scale, low-dollar participation, (iii) sub-second transaction finality suited to in-event redemptions such as concession-stand or harvest-dinner pass usage, and (iv) a native, contract-level token standard that enables transparent supply audit without reliance on third-party token registries.

The Project does not represent that the XPR Network is endorsed by, partnered with, or affiliated with the Project in any organizational sense. The Project is a user of the network, on the same terms available to any user, and assumes responsibility for its own programs and disclosures.

- Distribution model: Treasury-held, event-distributed, multi-signature-controlled.
- Retirement: On-chain burn to verifiable burn address upon program redemption.

10.4 Short-Form Network Description

The Project's short-form network listing description, suitable for exchange or aggregator profiles, is reproduced below for reference:

One Seed Token (SEED) is a utility token used within the One Seed Project ecosystem to support agricultural production, cooperative operations, and community health initiatives. The token enables transparent allocation of resources, participation tracking, and governance across approved programs. SEED does not represent equity, ownership, or profit rights and is designed solely for functional use within verified systems.

10.5 Wallet, Custody, and Access

Participants interact with SEED through XPR Network-compatible wallets, including WebAuth and other Antelope-standard wallets. The Project does not custody participant tokens by default; tokens issued for individual recognition or membership are delivered to participant-controlled wallet accounts. Project custody is reserved for treasury reserves, program escrow, and unallocated supply, and is held under multi-signature controls. KYC procedures apply where required by program scope or jurisdictional law.

10.6 Secondary Markets

SEED is observable in third-party secondary markets operating on the XPR Network, including decentralized exchanges such as Alcor. The Project does not operate, control, list on, promote, or rely upon these markets. The existence of secondary trading activity does not alter the Project's position that SEED is a utility token and is not offered as an investment instrument. The Project makes no representation as to the price, liquidity, or persistence of any secondary market and disclaims responsibility for participant activity occurring outside Project-operated programs.

10.7 Audit & On-Chain Transparency

The Project publishes treasury wallet addresses, program escrow addresses, and the burn address used for retirement transactions in its Quarterly Transparency Report. On-chain activity is reconcilable to off-chain program reporting. Any divergence is investigated by the Transparency Office and reported to the Board. Independent verification by any party is encouraged and explicitly supported by the public, indexable nature of the XPR Network ledger.

12. Risk Factors

The Project operates under explicit acknowledgement of the following categories of risk. This list is non-exhaustive.

Entity Formation Risk

The Project currently operates without a formal legal entity. This carries identifiable risks, including but not limited to: limited liability protection for founders and contributors, ambiguity in the enforceability of treasury custody and program commitments, potential complications in entering contracts or holding registered assets, dependency on the continued participation of identified founders, and constraints on the Project's ability to receive certain forms of institutional support that require a registered counterparty. The Project is actively working toward entity formation as a near-term priority. Until that structure is established, participation in the Project's programs should be assessed with awareness of these limitations.

Regulatory Risk

Token classification frameworks may evolve at the federal or state level. The Project may be required to modify program structures, tier offerings, or governance procedures in response to regulatory guidance. The Project commits to lawful adaptation rather than circumvention.

Reputational Risk

Misunderstanding of SEED as a speculative cryptocurrency could undermine community trust. The Project mitigates this through plain-language education, in-person counterparts for every digital instrument, and disciplined messaging that excludes investment language.

Operational Risk

Program execution depends on volunteer leadership, in-kind contributions, and partnerships with schools, churches, farms, and chambers. Disruption to any of these relationships may affect program timelines. The Project maintains overlapping program leadership to reduce single-point dependencies.

Technology Risk

Smart contract vulnerabilities, custody failures, or network outages could affect token operations. The Project mitigates through audited contract design, multi-signature treasury custody, and deliberate operational simplicity.

Concentration Risk

Disproportionate accumulation of SEED by any single participant could threaten governance integrity. The Project mitigates through capped voting weight, KYC at threshold, and burn-on-redemption mechanics that prevent passive accumulation.

Misuse Risk

Token-based fundraising can attract bad-faith actors. The Project mitigates through identity verification at material thresholds, clear terms of participation, and the right to suspend or terminate participation for cause.

Secondary Market Risk

SEED is observable in third-party secondary markets operating on the XPR Network. These markets exist without Project involvement and may exhibit volatility, low liquidity, or other characteristics common to early-stage tokens. The Project does not operate, custody, list on, market-make in, or promote these venues, and assumes no responsibility for activity occurring within them. Participants who choose to interact with secondary markets do so at their own discretion and risk. The Project's mitigation is structural: the design of SEED — fixed supply, burn-on-redemption, utility-only positioning, and absence of profit representations — is intended to minimize the conditions under which secondary trading could be confused with an investment offering by the Project.
